
Sonja has lived in Ketchikan all her life, and while she considers her home town rather small, she is ever impressed with the friendliness of the people.


FIRE SQUAD



With Mr. Hunsaker at the helm the Spanish Club planned monthly foreign films and slides. They also had a few parties including one big Christmas bash.








FRENCH CLUB






