



# Dedication



That Brewster Boy" was the senior play in which nearly all seniors took part either on or off the stage.


Larry Droogs and Carol Shellenbarger were named Best Mix-ers and Betty Lien ran second in the contest for Queen of the Yearbook.

THIS year the Student Council installed a permanent seating chart for the gym. Under the guidance of vice president Des Moore, housing was secured for visiting rooters and basketball teams.


The Council sponsored ushers for basketball games and provided identification arm bands. The president with consent of the council appoints the fire chief, his assistant and the fire squad.

They conducted the Junior Red Cross program and student contributions to the iron lung drive.

CACH year the Student Body Council apportions a definite percentage of money from membership fees for general expenses and to school organizations that have 100 per cent membership. This year \$600 was set aside for that purpose.

Amounts allotted for general expenses were: annual, \$90; flowers and cards, \$15; chaperons, \$20; SBA tickets, \$10.50; banquets, \$50; yell leaders, \$60; Kayhitems, \$30; added expenses, \$14.50.

School organizations received \$300 dividend as follows: athletics, 50% or \$150; journalism, 4% or \$12; debate, 4%, \$12; Torch Society, 5%, \$15; Latin Club, 4%, \$12; band, 14%, \$42; chorus 14%, \$42, and other clubs, 5% or \$15.

What the boys lack in experience they make up in enthusiasm. Football in Ketchikan is definitely finding its place, especially in the grade school, and


weather is no hindrance. The wetter the field, it seems, the more fun.

"Not that you win or lose, but how you play the game."










