




His foster parents, Bill and Susan Oliver, will continue housing Norbert until sometime in July of '72. On his way home, Norbert plans to take time to tour the U.S.

'1787'

Delegate's speeches, proposals, and debates filled the air during a simulation game called '1787'. The students took roles as delegates to the Second Constitutional Convention and ratified the Constitution.

Four students played the parts of George Washington, James Madison, Benjamin Franklin, and a journalist, Thomas Grant. All other students served as delegates or members of a delegation.

Each delegate represents a special "bundle of interests". For instance, he may be a landowner from a large Northern state; and feel that a weak central government serves the interest of his state; or he may come from a small Southern state, and desire a strong, central government which will protect shipping and maintain a stable currency.

As a final exam the classes were to compare the constitution they had compiled to the United States Constitution and the Constitution made up by a man named Tugwell.







The Student Body Council met during seventh hour every other day, during the 1971-1972 school year, and for the first time in the history of Kayhi, received 1/2 credit for attending the meetings. The students began organizing a committee to write a new school constitution, which later was passed by a school wide vote.

The council conferred with Kayhi Principal, R. W. Stekl, about the no "hot pants" ruling, after which girls were allowed to wear them "within reason." At the request of the Student Body Council, Stekl presented a request for an area in which the students would be allowed to smoke. The School Board Voted to:

"Permit smoking in the Art Room area on a trial basis, and ask the Student Body to be responsible for the litter that might accumulate around the building." This is for a "trial period" only--evaluation will be continuous, so whether this area will be in existence in years to come is not yet known.

The Jeremiah People, a young group of singers formerly associated with the Continental singers, presented to the students of Kayhi a varied program of skits and songs in early September. The program took place in the Kayhi Auditorium with a student admission of 50¢ per person.





LIBRARIAN AND AIDE

The library, once characterized by the "shhhhhh" of a librarian, is a thing of the past. The "materials center" is probably one of the least quiet areas of a modern school, and the Kayhi materials center is no exception.

Any hour of the day dozens of students can be seen checking out and using phonographs and headsets, records, filmstrips, cassette recorders, microfilm readers, as well as the old standby books and magazines.

Entire classes work together on research projects as do individual students.

With a current budget of about \$5000, two full-time employees and a student staff of five, oversee 800 filmstrips, 10,000 volumes, and some 100 magazines. The library also houses a complete file of Kayhi annuals dating from 1925.
