Varsity Cheerleaders



The volleyball team was never in competition until the All-Southeast Tournament in Juneau, yet they placed 4th out of 8 teams.







The sensitive box needed no further prodding, and set off the first fire alarm of the school year.


Total escape time was 135 seconds, definitely a poor show.





The team worked especially hard the following week as they traveled to Wrangell to participate in the Wrangell Nar-rows Invitational. The Kings prevailed (cont. page 139)





















Kayhi's boys were in good form throughout the season. But improvement was bound to come as the hours of practice build up.




Wrestlers gain valuable experience at Takedown Tournament.


Jim Fitzgerald takes referee's position over Jim Schenk during practice.
