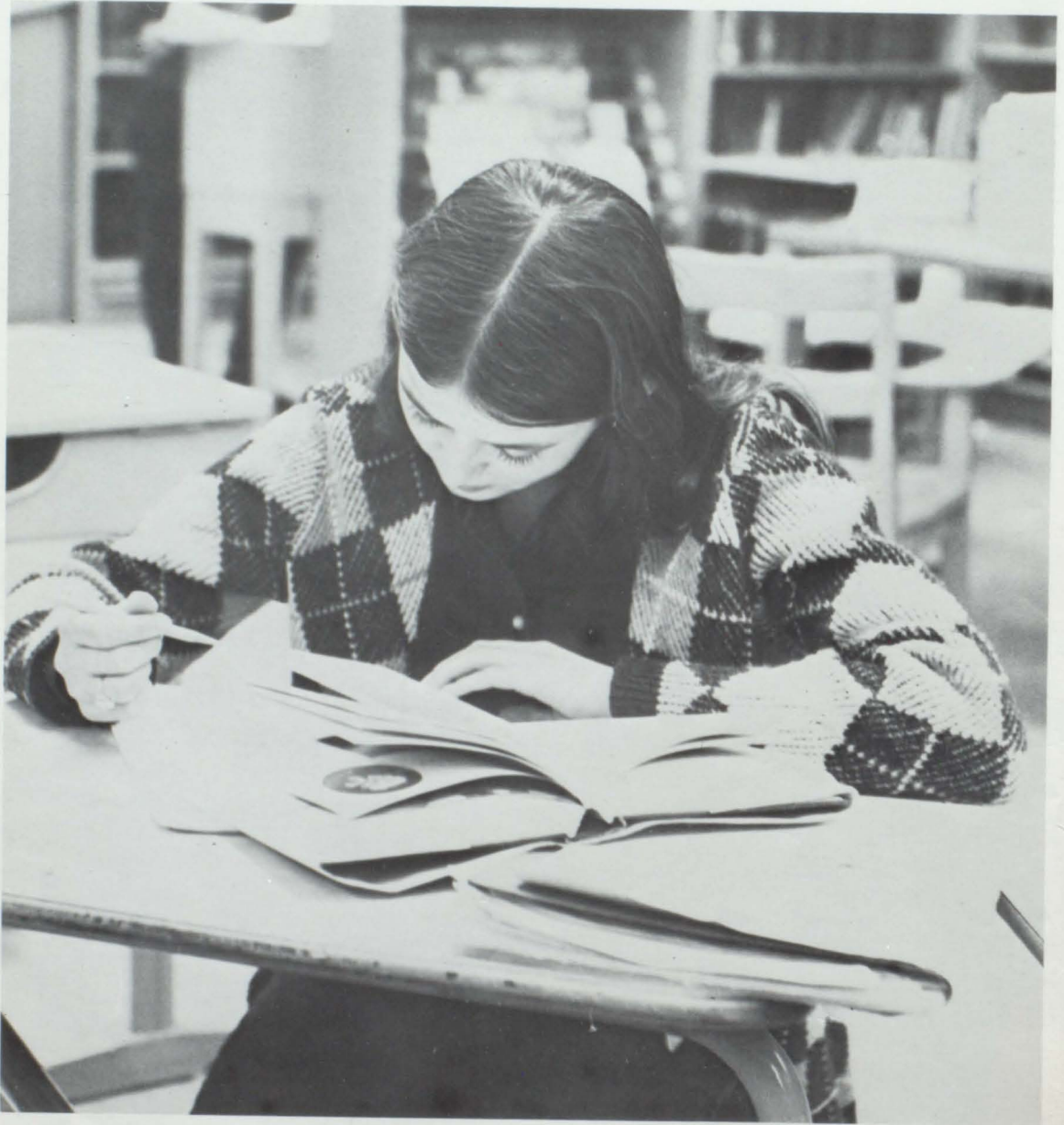

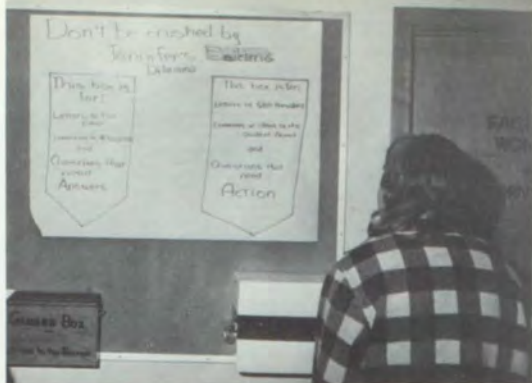

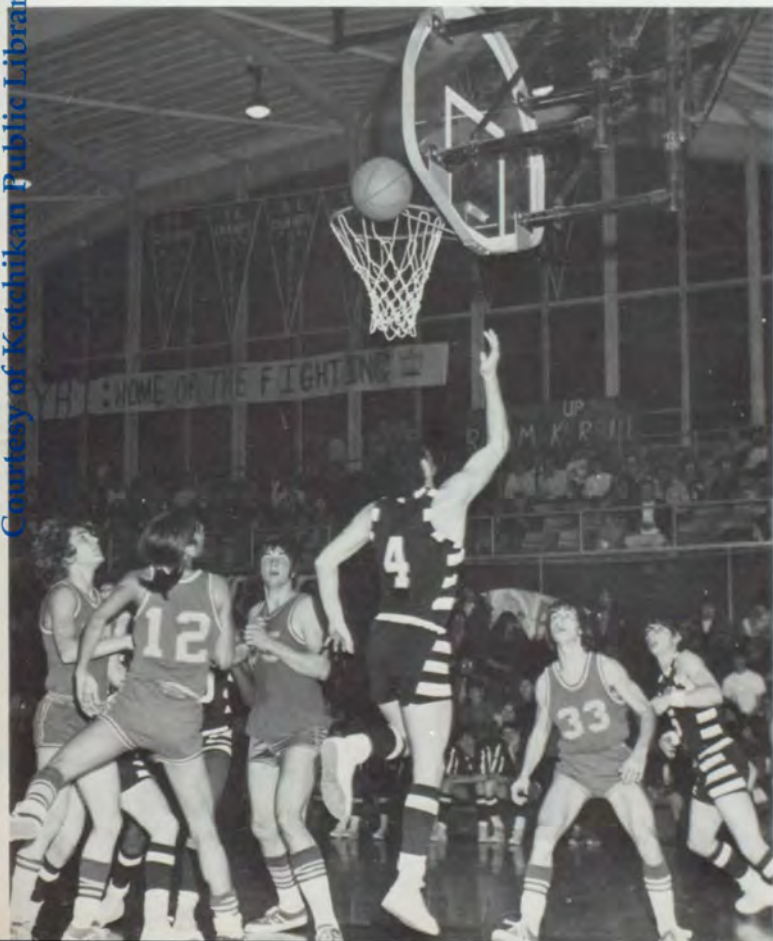
Mr. Hansen Named Mr. Irresistible

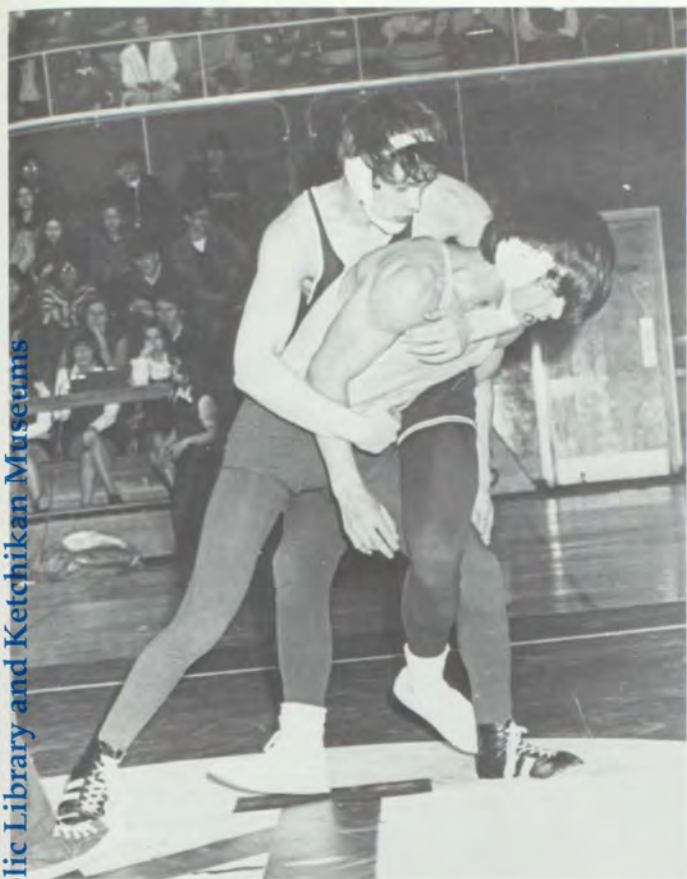

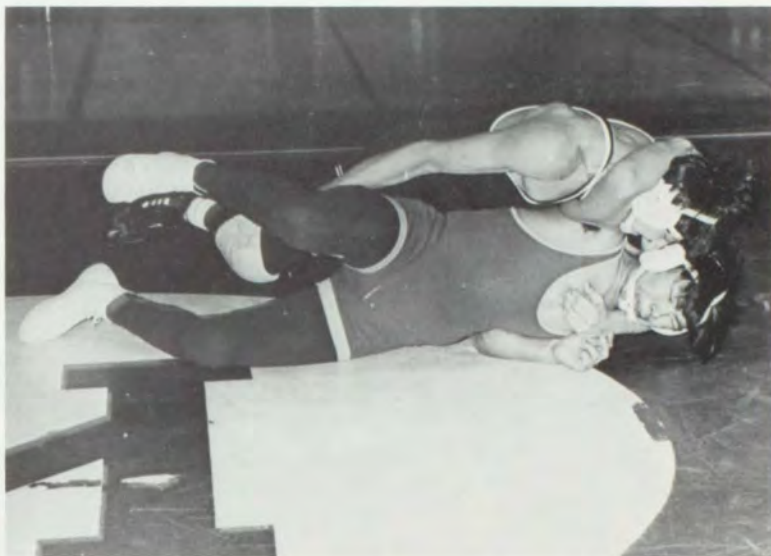

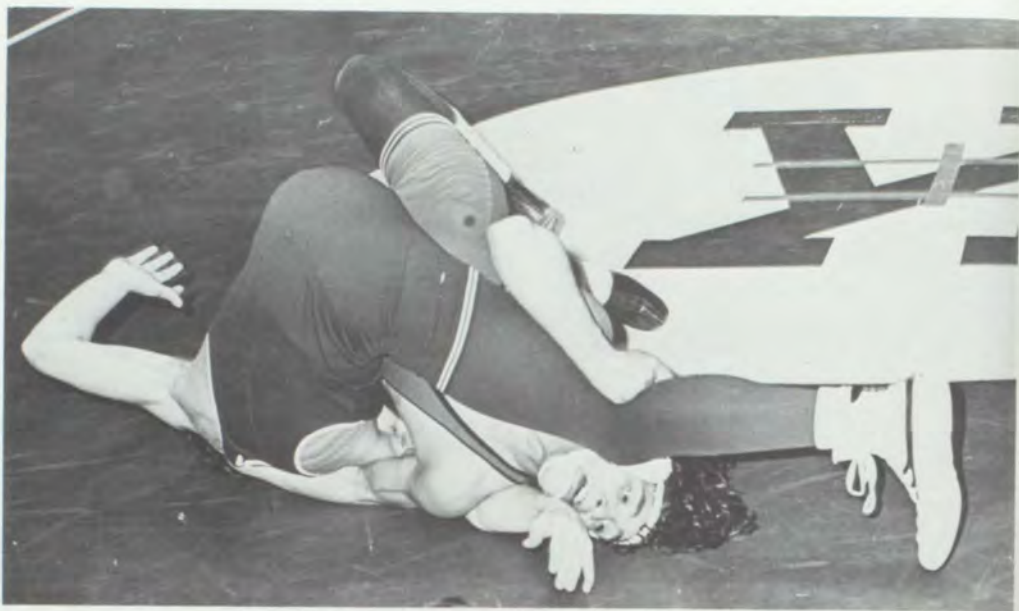

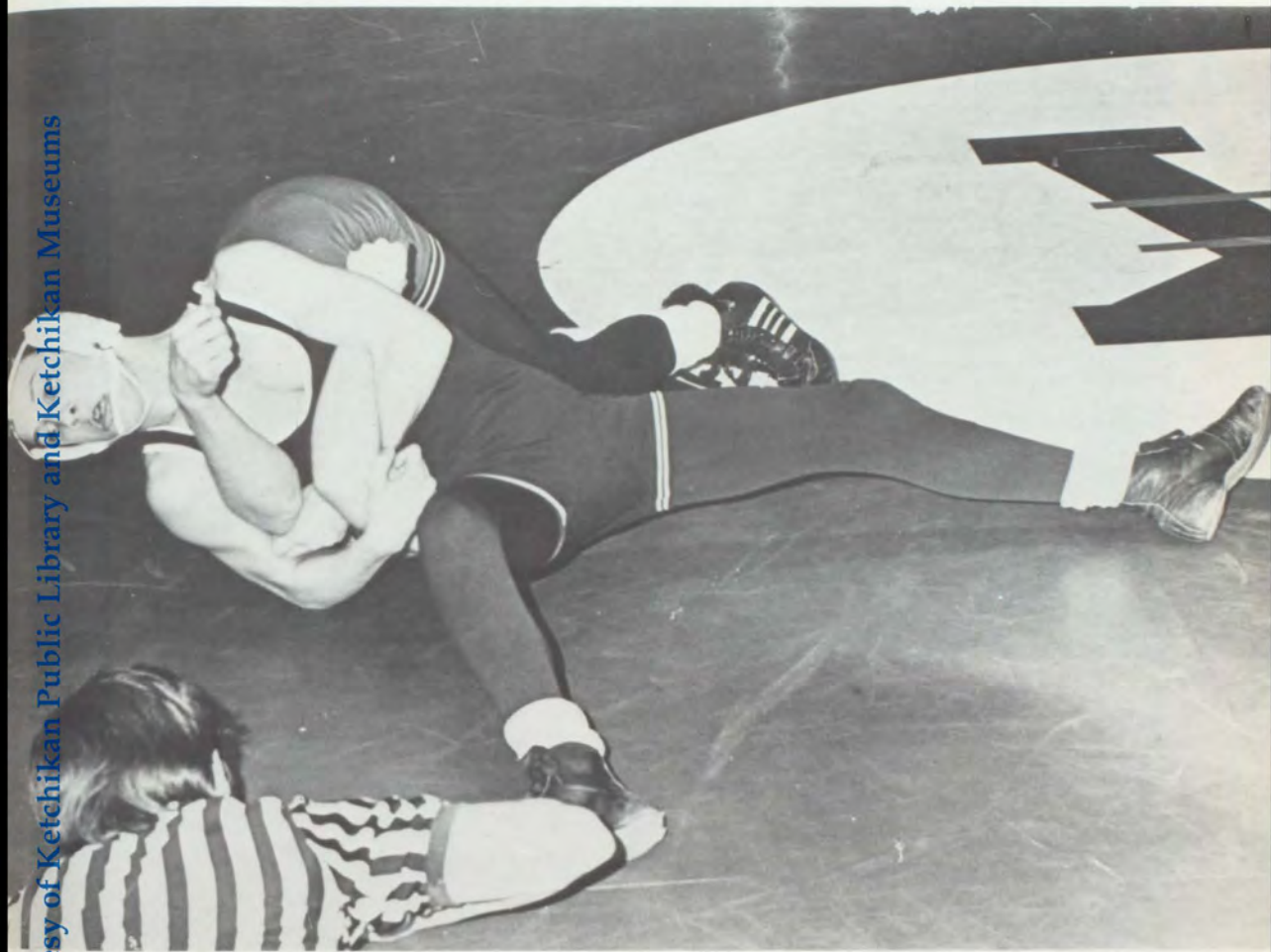

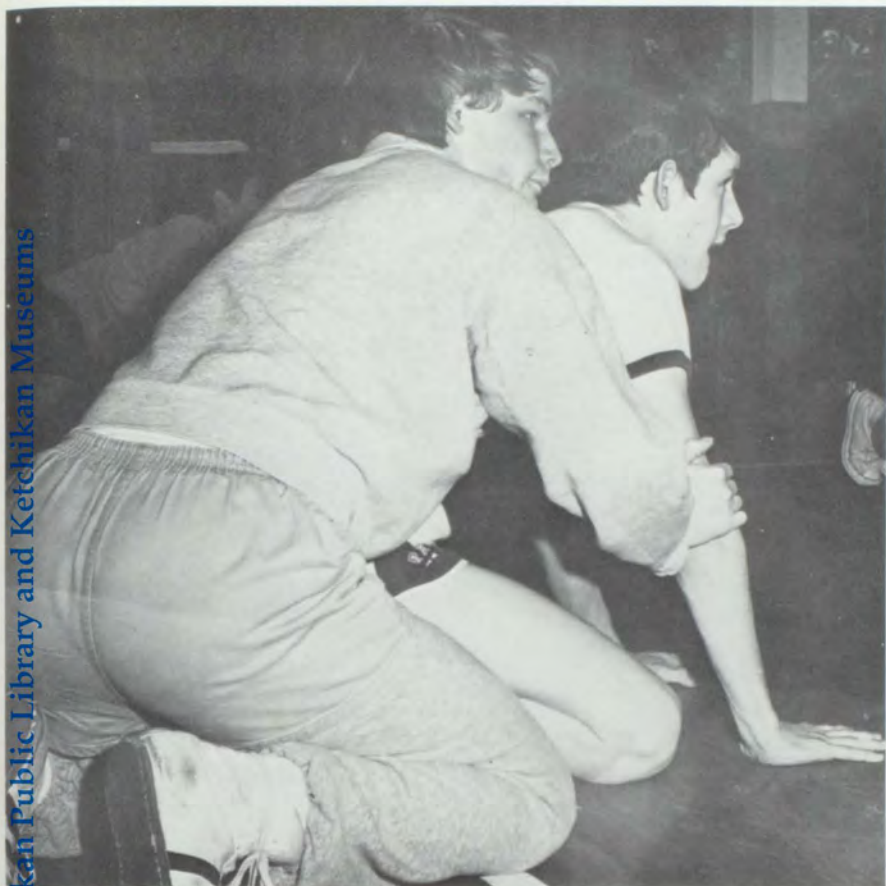
