



School life revolves around the student and his many activities, scholastic and recreational. The KAYHI for 1954 portrays the student as the cornerstone of the annual.



Present Main School Building Erected in 1924

"HE first school, established here in 1900, occupied one floor of a building used also as a lodge and a courthouse. This building was located at 343 Main Street. Enrollment was 19 in the first year.


The top floor of the present Main School, erected in 1924, was used as a high school for



30 years. Enrollment in high school has increased to its present 275. During late years, classes have become larger and rooms increasingly inadequate.

The lower is the architects' final vision of the new school now being built. Completion should be in November, and present plans are to occupy the new building during and immediately after Christmas vacation, 1954.

High school buildings, shown in these pictures, are the cornerstones of Ketchikan's education. They show the development of Ketchikan and its increased interest in the welfare of its young people.





J. E. Danielson, Superintendent of Schools

" ${f B}$ UILDING" seems to be the theme of J. E. Danielson's nine years as superintendent of schools in Ketchikan. The total faculty has grown from 36 to 60, the total enrollment from 765 to 1450, or nearly double.

Much actual building and remodeling has taken place, including the addition to White Cliff school, interior remodeling in that school, installation of flourescent lights in all classrooms, complete remodeling of Deermount, and lunch room facilities at White Cliff, remodeling and addition of classrooms at Main school. The school district was changed from a city district to an independent school district in 1948. The assessed valuation of the school district has increased from \$13.5 million to its present \$23 million since 1945.

Mr. Danielson came here from Scobey, Montana, where he was superintendent of schools. He has attended the Universities of North Dakota and Montana for a period of seven years and holds the degrees of Bachelor of Science in Commerce and Master of Science in Education. He has accumulated several credit hours beyond his Master's degree. He spends most of his limited spare time at his cabin at Pond Reef and says that the best thing about it is "I cannot be reached by telephone."

Mr. Danielson's activities include membership in the following organizations: Lions Club, past president and past director; Ketchikan Chamber of Commerce; Alaska Council, Boy Scouts; secretary, Board of Deacons, Lutheran Church; Territorial Textbook Commisison; Masonic Lodge, York Rite; Phi Delta Kappa, educational honor society; American Association of School Administrators; National Education Association, and the Alaska Education Association.


THE beginning and most important part of the new Ketchikan High School is the cornerstone, around which this edition of The KAYHI '54 is built.

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

MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

PROGRESS and growth in a community is measured by the building and construction carried on within its limits. Likewise, in a school, the progress and growth of each individual student is an indication of the type of building and construction for which it stands.

Building is an all-important part of the school program. The type of building which each student builds for himself is largely up to the individual. Four years, the average length of a high school course, are required to lay the foundation for his adult life. This foundation calls for 720 days of school attendance and work well done.

Each day's work constitutes a brick in that foundation. For each day of school work missed, there will be a vacant space—a brick will be missing in the fcundation. Ten days absence —ten bricks missing. For each day of school work poorly done, there will be a faulty brick. For each day of work well done, there will be a strong and sturdy brick.

After school days are over, the type of a superstructure each person builds for him or herself will rest upon the brick foundation that each person is now building—brick by brick, day by day.



Four Years of Building

Celebrating our many wins, we pulled a trump with the Junior Prom using the theme "Pink Nightmares." The prom was free to all students, faculty and invited guests. This prom was Kayhi's first free prom and was a great success.

We played a great game in our freshman year by turning the gym into a football field on the night of the Freshman Frolic. It was probably the first time anyone had ever danced on a basketball floor turned into a football field. It was very effective.

Sitting out the game this time the boys allowed themselves to be taken. Taken to the Sophomore Hop that is, where the gym was transformed into a Winter Wonderland. The affair was tolo and the girls paid all the expenses.

Deciding we needed some way to identify

ourselves, we ordered class pins and rings. The designs were all uniform with the exception that some were set with stones. This again was something new to Kayhi.

Even though '54 was to be our best year at Kayhi we didn't want everyone to forget us so we played a game with the fate of forgetfulness and to checkmate the game, Jeanette Allain designed our banner which will remain in Kayhi's auditorium so the coming generations will always be reminded of that great class of '54. The banner was in class colors, blue and gold showing the familiar polar bear surrounded by an olive wreath symbolizing courage and victory.



This was the play that thrilled the audience night after night. The audience screeched with horror one minute and laughed hilariously the next, at Aunt Tessie's dry witticisms.





Drill Team Marches On








- Their Achievements

Two faculty members were on the championship team, W. C. Martineson and Harlan Johnson, both helping the Eagles greatly in their bid for the title.
















Home Ec., Art-Creative Classes

What Happened This Year

A GREAT many events occurred this past year, some of them world-shaking, some of them merely interesting.

The biggest bang in politics was the feud between Wisconsin's Senator Joe McCarthy and Secretary of the Army Stevens. They disagreed over the special treatment given Pvt. David Schine, a former member of McCarthy's investigating force. Treatment of army officers before investigating committees also came up for discussion.

"Mr. Republican," Ohio Senator Robert A. Taft, died and left a void in the party that will be hard to fill. California's governor, Earl Warren, was appointed chief justice of the United State Supreme Court when Fred M. Vinson died and left that chair vacant.

Travel, as ever, was popular. Vice-President Richard Nixon and his wife, Pat, went on a round-the-world goodwill tour as representatives of the Eisenhower administration. Former democratic presidential candidate Adlai E. Stevenson also made a world trip, for the purpose of investigating conditions and American sentiment abroad.

Women in the News

Women were prominent in many activities, the chief of which was the tradition-rich coronation of Queen Elizabeth II of the British Commonwealth of Nations. She and her husband, Prince Phillip, started on a six-month tour of the Commonwealth.

Shortly after the corcnation, word reached London that a British expedition had reached the top of Mount Everest, considered the highest in the world and one of the most difficult to climb. They said it was a "coronation present for the queen."

Mme. Vijaya Pandit, sister cf Prime Minister Nehru of India, was elected the first woman president of the UN General Assembly. Clare Booth Luce was given the assignment as U. S. Ambassador to Italy.

Korean Truce

One of the most talked about subjects of the year was Communism. A truce was gained for the Korsan war, in which the UN forces intervened against the aggressors in South Korea, and many American soldiers returned home. Indo-China is in a delicate position, with both the Communists and the western nations trying to defeat each other's cause without starting an actual war.

Most countries were building up their military might, and we were experimenting with the hydrogen bomb. Several test explosions were set off in the South Pacific. East Germans were escaping in increasing numbers to the "Free" western zone controlled by the U. S., Great Britain and France. They didn't like the Communist rule.

Sir Winston Churchill, Prime Minister of Great Britain, was awarded the Nobel Prize in Literature for his memoirs of the second World War. The first Nobel Peace Prize to be awarded in two years went to Dr. Albert Schweitzer, world famous organist, who is a medical missionary in Africa.

'Oscars' Awarded

Honors in the entertainment world are symbolized by the gold Oscars awarded to Hollywood's Academy Award winners.

This year Oscars went to William Holden for comical "Stalag 17" and to Audrey Hepburn for the delightful "Roman Holiday." In the same week Miss Hepburn was awarded a Toni, the Broadway equivalent of an Oscar, for being the best actress of the year for her role in "Ondine."

"From Here to Eternity" was considered the best movie of the year. It won eight Oscars. Some of the most popular of the songs were "I Believe," "Ebb Tide," and "Stranger in Paradise."

Clothes Make News

With the coming of spring, a young woman's fancy seriously turns to thoughts of what she will wear. Making headlines this year were orlon or nylon coats that can be tossed in the washing machine, full skirts held out by even fuller bouffant petticoats, the "squaw dress" inspired by Navajo women's costumes, and bright, brighter, brightest colors in cotton dresses. Big news for men was the narrower ties shown this spring.

This Year Here

While all these things were happening in the world with its 275 billion people, Ketchikan with its eight thousand population was busy also.

Foremost industrially was the near completion of the \$50 million pulp mill at Ward Cove, scheduled to begin operations in late May 1954.

All Alaskans were vitally interested in the statehood debate that swept the nation and its possible effect on the Territory. A bill introducing statehood for both Alaska and Hawaii was introduced in Congress, sent into committee, rewritten, revised and reworded, sent back to the Senate and passed after a violent struggle.

The plan of splitting the Territory and giving statehood to the populated part was pro-

posed, as was a scheme that would grant both Hawaii and Alaska commonwealth status.

Transportation was speeded up considerably when Pan American Airways put several new DC-6B Clippers on the Seattle-Juneau run. The record flight from Juneau to Seattle was two hours, fifty minutes, with the help of a strong south wind.

The tunnel project at Front and Grant, designed to eliminate a bad corner, was begun. A roadblock was set up on both ends of the tunnel, and traffic often waited for literally hours, much to the annoyance and disgust of the drivers.

Ketchikan Construction

With the influx of construction people into Ketchikan, living space was at a premium. The Austin Towers building under construction and the completed Wingren apartments were expected to relieve the situation.

Tongass View Homes project, next to the new high school building was begun. The 200home project was intended primarily for pulp mill families, although any resident may buy a home.

Civic Progress

Instigated by Emery Tobin, "Alaska Sportsman" editor, a grand jury investigation of reputed vice and graft in the city was held. Action on this report is still in progress.

A wealthy New Mexico-Texas oil man, Ellis Hall, and his family, crashed in their light plane en route to Bellingham. Canadian Mounties, the U. S. Coast Guard and many private individuals participated in the extensive search for the wreckage. It was found by Herman Ludwigsen of Ketchikan, who received the \$25,000 reward. Part of the money was split among all the Ellis Air flyers who searched and another part was contributed to the Guiding Light Home and the new Civic Center. Television came to Ketchikan for the first time. At present, all programs are "canned" instead of live, but station KATV hopes to have only live programs eventually.

Lions Club spearheaded a drive for an Armory-Community Center building now proposed.

Kayhi's basketball team went to the Southeastern Alaska Championship tournament at Sitka, but were eliminated before the finals. The "Cupcake Cuties," ten girls who were determined to get to the tournament by hook or any other way, sold cupcakes at noon, took in donations and held a dance to raise the necessary money for their plane fare. They succeeded, much to the amazement of everyone but themselves.

Alaska News

Elsewhere in Alaska, the fishermen "enjoyed" the poorest fishing season in 20 years, with prospects for next season not much better. Some fish traps have been eliminated by the Legislature to conserve the salmon.

Near Anchorage, Mt. Spur erupted suddenly, pouring sooty volcanic ash on the surrounding area for several days and even weeks.

At Metlakatla, the sanctuary of the William Duncan Memorial Church was completed and dedicated in an impressive ceremony. About 600 people from Ketchikan and Metlakatla attended.

Ground was broken for the new high school building in early November and rapid progress was made. The cornerstone ceremony was performed by the Masonic Lodge of Ketchikan May 8, with the Grand Master from Seattle officiating.

Finally—seniors successfully completed a prescribed four year course in Ketchikan High School and received diplomas.

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
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
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


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Mixed Emotions




