





Eighth Grade

WHILE the eighth grade has not been a part of the high school curriculum, its rooms have been located in the new building and their work has been under the supervision of the high school principal.

They had their own class organizations, social activities and programs. They attended high school assemblies that were considered of interest to them.

Work of the art classes under the supervision of Mrs. John Doyle made many colorful and often near professional displays in the show cases.

One of the most valuable projects of the group under the supervision of Guy E. Poorman was the eighth grade store which sold school supplies to all students. They stocked pencils, pens, notebook paper and other materials for the same prices at which they could be purchased elsewhere and made a small profit that provided funds for class projects.

Home room teachers supervised their folding and stuffing of the envelopes with Christmas seals at that season.

Their basketball tournament created much interest. Teams from this class played preliminary games at some of the high school games, and many of the class played in the Church League basketball teams.

Harland E. Johnson who has a B.S. degree from the University of Minnesota taught social studies and mathematics.

Mrs. John Doyle with a B.S. degree from Northeastern State Colege Oklahoma, taught art and education.

Guy E. Poorman with a B.A. and M.A. degree from Peabody Teachers College, taught social studies, Mrs. Earl Smith taught English.

Cafeteria

THE cafeteria is an organized unit of the school, headed by Mrs. Harold Miller with Mrs. Arthur Sund as her assistant.

These women plan the meals so that everyone will get his requirement of health building food.

They arrive at school early in the morning and often do not leave until after school is dismissed in the afternoon.

In this time they are busy preparing the day's meal, serving it at noon, then cleaning up the kitchen to start on the meal for the next day.

They order the groceries, some of which are supplied by the government as surplus commodities.

At noon they are helped in their work by two shifts of high school students who receive free meals in return for their work.


USES that transport students who live more than a mile from school are operated by the Northern Bus Co., owned by Barber and Eichner. They also have 20 buses with regular runs in town.

Students come from as far as 16 miles to the north and nine miles to the south of the city.





Student Body Association







About 20 were able to make the trip to Sitka. All were flown there.








The championship contest with Sitka high was also a rubber game since the two teams had divided a two-game series earlier.

While some problems were being created, others were being solved in the summit conference held in Geneva which saw the leaders of France, England, America and Russia in conference.

French Morocco received her long-desired nominal independence from France.

During this tension there were some good times also. Winter Olympic games were held in Switzerland and the 4-minute mile was run for the first time by two men on one track, one from England and the other from Australia.

Also, romance was in the air. Princess Margaret of England sacrificed the love of Peter Townsend for the Church of England and royal duty.

United States Headlines

The grave news of President Eisenhower's heart attack shook the world, causing a drop in the stock market.

One of the worst issues in our history segregation—was blown wide open. Many instances of rioting occurred dealing a severe blow to human relations.

Westinghouse Electric workers were on strike for many weeks. Floods, tornadoes, hurricanes and blizzards swept the country, causing disaster and deaths.

Life had more than misery. It was Leap year now and Cupid played his part. Grace Kelly became the modern day princess by marrying the last eligible monarch in Prince Rainier of Monaco.

Long-eligible Margaret Truman took advantage of the year and married an assistant to the editor of the New York Times.

On academy award night, Oscars were awarded to: best actress, Anna Magnani; best actor, Ernest Borgnine; best picture, Marty; best song, Love is a Many Splendored Thing.

One of the controversial measures hit the headlines in the soil bank farm plan. It was not included in the fixed-parity bill passed by congress and vetoed by President Eisenhower who then upped support payments.

Sports tradition was upset when Brooklyn beat the Yankees in the world series for the first time.

Color TV became a reality and radio networks started \$64,000 giveaways.

The age of atomic power and jet propulsion came into being.

Alaska News Summary

It was another poor fishing season in 1955, affecting the economy of all Alaska.

Judge George Folta, a true Alaska pioneer, died on a bear hunt of a heart attack after many years of hard work in Alaska.

Tentative plans were made for the new pulp mill at Sitka.

Statehood and fish traps, still extremely important to Alaskans, were the main topics of conversation.

What Happened This Year

A constitution for the proposed state of Alaska was drafted on the University of Alaska campus at College and ratified by Alaska voters by a wide margin April 24, 1956.

With the discovery of commercial uranium, Southeastern Alaska took on new economic importance.

Ketchikan Happenings

Just before Christmas we received a grand present in the completion of the arterial highway beyond the tunnel.

After years of debate, we also ordered a water chlorination system.

With inauguration of daily plane service by Pacific Northern, added to that of Pan American World Airways, Ketchikan took a bigger place on the aviation map. They say "competition is the spice of life." The planes land on Annette island from where Ellis Airlines planes bring passengers to Ketchikan. Also there are daily flights to Prince Rupert and Juneau with many regular trips to outlying settlements, logging camps and canneries.

Besides, there is talk of a ferry service between Ketchikan and Annette.

A great disaster in Ketchikan was the fire at a local boat storage which destroyed 71 pleasure craft. It really hit home.

The seasonal salmon derby was won on a 65-pound king.

Fishermen are again out trying to lure the largest fish of the new season. A woman caught a 62-pounder May 8, 1956.

On The School Scene

First and of greatest importance was our occupancy of the new high school building. While not all equipment was installed, school began and open house for the public was held Sept. 11. The Parent-Teachers Association, Student Body Association Council and faculty were hosts to more than 1000 visitors.

In March the Southeastern Alaska Basketball tournament teams competed before capacity crowds in the new gym here.

Our sport pages pleased local fans, for we are the proud owners of the Kayhi Kings, ALL-ALASKA basketball champs.

Our enrollment was increased during the year by new students and the coming of eighth graders to the new building. If new classrooms, just started at the close of school, are completed next year, the seventh graders will be here also.

Future Teachers of America were reorganized and Future Homemakers of America were organized for the first time.

All in all, we are certainly holding our own to prove that Ketchikan is truly the "Gateway to Alaska."

So the proud seniors, heads held high, leave Kayhi and new freshmen will start bobbing about next fall—next year when there will be more shaking events; events that affect all of us.

Sadness at the close of school comes with the loss of several faculty members. Mr. and Mrs. Ray Bassett, who have been here many years, and Douglas Davies, who has been here four years, have been granted leaves of absence. We look forward to their return in a year.

W. C. Martineson, coach of the All-Alaska champs, has resigned to enter training for dentistry. Vernon Gallup will leave the profession. Miss Mildred Gelston will go to her home where her mother is ill.






